The **Graduate School One Health-Emerging Infectious Diseases (1H-EID)** is a multidisciplinary training and research program based at **Université Paris Cité** that aims to educate and prepare the next generation of experts to understand, anticipate, and respond to emerging and re-emerging infectious diseases using a One Health approach.

Emerging infectious diseases are not only biological events but also **social, political, and historical phenomena**. Patterns of emergence, detection, and response are shaped by social inequalities, institutional arrangements, modes of knowledge production, and relationships between humans, animals, and environments.

The webinar presents **contributions from anthropology, sociology, history, political science, and science and technology studies** to the study of emerging infectious diseases. Presentations are given in English or in French.
